From the Pastor's Desk

On Sunday, July 16th, we celebrated the Fifteenth Sunday of the Year, cycle A. The Liturgy of the Word included a reading from the Prophet Isaiah (55:10-11), portions of Psalm 65, a reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans (8:18-23), and a reading from the holy Gospel of Matthew (13:1-23).

The Gospel included the Parable of the Sower and Jesus' explanation of the parable. No farmer who is interested in a profit would be as lavish in spreading seed as the farmer in that parable. A discreet farmer is careful to sow only in places which are sure to produce results. But the farmer in the Gospel is lavish with the seed since he represents God who is always generous with his gifts.

The seed represents the Word of God which is found in the inspired pages of Sacred Scripture. There are 46 books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New. God sows his seed in our minds and in our hearts primarily by means of the Liturgy of the Word within the celebration of the Mass.

In the last 60 years there have been many changes in what we feel comfortable calling the Liturgy of the Word but used to be called the Mass of the Catechumens. When I first started serving Mass as an Altar Boy, there were two readings at Mass; a reading from an Epistle and a reading from the Gospel of Matthew. These were read in Latin with the Priest facing the wall. Pope Saint John XXIII, before the Second Vatican Council, changed the readings into the vernacular and they were to be read from the pulpit. Today, when the extraordinary form of the Mass (the old form of the Mass in Latin) is celebrated, these changes must be included.

In the previous liturgy, the same readings were used every year so that it was impossible to get a representative sampling of the richness of the Bible. One result of this arrangement was that some magnificent passages were never heard by Catholics on Sundays. The parable of the Prodigal Son was not part of any Sunday liturgy; neither was the story of the Good Samaritan.

Epistles supplied the first reading but a long list of what was omitted could be compiled. The Acts of the Apostles, the story of the early Church, was chosen only once a year on Pentecost Sunday. Nothing from the Old Testament or the Book of Revelation was read at Sunday Mass.

The Second Vatican Council, using the image of riches, decreed that "the treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly so that richer fare may be provided for the faithful" (*Constitution on the Liturgy*, 51). The revised Liturgy has fulfilled this decree by selecting biblical passages over a three year period on Sundays rather than one, and by supplying two readings rather than one, before the Gospel.

This current year, known as Cycle A, features the Gospel according to St. Matthew. Cycle B presents the Gospel according to St. Mark, and Cycle C that according to St. Luke. The Gospel according to St. John is used primarily on the Sundays of the A cycle during Lent, during the Easter Season, and to fill out the B cycle. Throughout the Easter Season the first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles; otherwise, the first reading is from writings other than the Gospels. The Book of Revelation is the second reading during the Easter season on Cycle C.

To appreciate these generous presentations of the treasure of the Bible, we must all make sure that we are prompt in coming to Mass. In fact, we ought to see to it that we get to church in plenty of time to settle down so we may pay close attention to the readings. We are to listen in faith that it is Christ who speaks to us when the Scriptures are proclaimed (see the *Constitution on the Liturgy*, 56-57).

Granting the importance of the Word, what about Holy Communion? One way to view Communion is to see that the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of the Lord is like the rain and the snow which come down from heaven to make the earth fruitful. Holy Communion gives us the means we need to turn the Scriptures we hear into the truth which guides and directs our lives according to God's will. The Holy Spirit had not only inspired the pages of the Bible; the Holy Spirit had blessed us through the work of the Second Vatican Council.

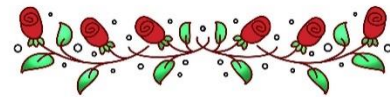
PARISH PICNIC
